The estimates to be published must contain three years of comparison in order that voters at the budget meeting may know exactly where they stand on increases or decreases.
The budget estimates will be published in the county official papers, the Argus and the News-Times, and will appear either next week or that following.

ROAD LEVIES
Special road district levies were made yesterday in many county road districts. All of the return were not sent in this morning, but it is known that a few defeated the levies. Those reported as voting ten mills are Districts 3, 4, 5, 9, 11, 13, 14, 19, 21, 24, 25, 32, 42, 44, 45, 48, 50, 53, 56 and 16; Dist. 8 voted 9 mills; Dist. 15 voted 5 mills; 26 voted 3 mills; 37 voted 5 mills; 54 voted 5 mills, and 57 voted 3 mills. Returns up to noon showed that 20 districts had voted the 10 mill tax and it is thought quite a number more will report a like vote. District 17, at Banks, voted down the special tax, and the Kinton district voted 9 mills.
