Fred L. Colfelt Sues R. H. Par-sons, Banker, for \$31,000 SUIT OVER REALTY TRADE

Plaintiff Alleges Misrepresentations as to Timber on Tract

Fred L. Colfelt and wife, of Sherwood, have sued R. H. Parsons, a banker of that place, for damages in the sum of \$31,000, the suit being the culmination of a real estate deal between plaintiffs and defendants in November, 1918. Plaintiffs Colfelt contend that they did not know of the misrepresentation until all of two years

after the deal had been closed. The complaint alleges that the Colfelts owned four business lots in Sherwood and also were in title to 121/2 acres near that village, worth, above the encumbrance of \$9,000, the sum of \$31,000. Parsons had, or alleged he had, 680 acres of land in Deschutes county. any goat glands for he walked which contained four million feet in from the ranch and started of pine timber. The Colfelts say that Parsons represented to them that the acreage and timber, water rights and water shares, together with a homestead relinquishment which went into the deal, were reasonable worth \$31. 000.
