It entered a field against a daily newspaper which carried a splendid news service at all times, and yet, the Journal thrived, and grew, and today stands as a newspaper institution de Luxe. GEO. L. PARKER SUICIDES

George L. Parker, well known in the North Plains and West Union sections, suicided in Portland yesterday, by jumping from the Morrison street bridge. The leap from the structure was witnessed by Otis Cole, first officer of the steamer Undine. Cole dispatched deck-hands in a boat to rescue Parker, and as soon as he was taken from the river the unfortunate man was taken to the harbor patrol headquarters, where every effort was made to revive him, but he was so far gone that the efforts were fruitless.

Parker lived for many years in the northern part of the county, and was a brother of Aunt Sally Jackson, who lived at old Glen-cue for many years. He had been living with a daughter, Mrs. J. D. Bennett, of 497 Sumner St., Portland, and was injured in an auto accident several months ago. Since his injury he had been using a crutch. Just before he leaped into the river he discarded his cane, crutch and overcoat, and they were later found on the bridge deck. He is survived by a daughter and son, in Portland, and another daughter in Seattle.

SYNOPSIS

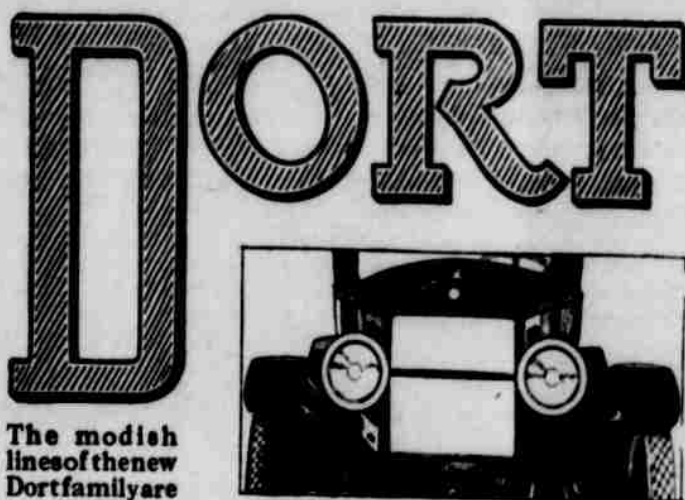
