THE FARMER

The farmer has learned in the past few years that organization has gained him a hearing in the councils of the Nation at Washington, D. C. He has been long finding out that he had a right to organize for mutual offense and defense in our national life, and when he realizes it more fully he will be better off financially. Every student of political economy knows that the farmer not only pays his own tax, but, incidentally, pays the great per cent, of profit out of which all tax is paid. Therefore, it ill behooves a man to ridicule any movement of the tillers of the soil to better their financial condition. The farmer is here to stay while the transient comes and goes tomorrow.

Farmers everywhere are just now engaged in attempting to solve the problems of government and to put obstacles in their way to invite disaster later on.

HOMEWARD BOUND

Pacific Grove, Cal., March 26.—Editor Argus: We are still on the turf. On leaving Hillsboro we motored to California, and let me tell you that Oregon has as good roads on the route South as California—in fact better than Northern California. We took the inside route (they have a coast route also) and went thru Redding, Sacramento, Stockton, Fresno, Bakersfield, Los Angeles, Long Beach and to San Diego. From there we motored to El Centro, in the Imperial Valley, where we camped two weeks with parties from Oregon and Washington. We saw them going cotton and all of us went to Mexicali, Mexico, and from there we went back to San Diego and then to Santa Barbara and Ventura, thru beautiful orange, lemon and walnut groves on our way to Paso Robles and Pacific Grove, where we have been since Jan. 9. Close to 20 inches of rain has fallen here this winter. Farmers like the rain, but they do not relish the freeze, the damages from which cost at least seventeen millions. It did not stop at that for the cold froze the new wood in the trees, thus cutting down future crops. California is a beautiful place to spend the winter in, but the rancher earns his money here. His product is fruit, the most of it perishable, while Oregon has many crops that are not.

In the Imperial Valley much acreage is idle, as cotton was in a slump last year and the banks were hard hit by loans to the growers, many of whom are now broke. Give us old Oregon, all the time. Apricots and almonds are in full bloom here now and it is beautiful. We will pass thru Frisco on our way home. So far we have made the trip without auto trouble, one slow leak being our only annoyance.

We will start for Oregon in 10 days, and T. C. Reynolds and family arrive here tomorrow to make the trip home with us.
