TOTAL TAX COLLECTED

The total taxes booked on the cash book at the tax counter, ending with last night's receipts, amount to \$324,474.34, with 5221 receipts written. There is still a large sum in the mails which have accumulated and the office presumes that this will throw the receipts up to at least a half million dollars, altho it may fall short. The total on the rolls is the neat little sum of \$1,079,481.47.

The last three days of the collection were busy ones at the counter, averaging over 350 receipts per day.
