HOW ABOUT TWIG MINER?

"Shall I spray for peach and prune twig miner or cultivate the orchard at the proper time?" Many growers have been asking since the late spring has kept them out of the orchards when the spray of lime sulfur for the twig miner should have been applied. While injury by the miner in recent years has been serious enough to warrant annual spraying for its control, the fact remains that where limited time compels a choice between spraying for it and doing the plowing when the right time comes, the latter is by far the most important. The spray may be safely applied, however, up until the early "pink" stage by reducing the strength of the spray to 9 to 100.—County Agent.
