HEALTH NURSE REPORT

The county health nurse, Miss Walker, put in a very busy March, for she organized community groups at Sherwood, Laurelhurst, Gaston and Hillsboro, besides investigating several cases of tuberculosis, and giving instruction as to their care.

To show that the work of the nurse is needed, it was found that out of the 153 pupils inspected, only 3 were without defects. Out of the 153 children examined, 14 had defective vision; 143 defective teeth; 135 defective tonsils; 18 defective glands; 3 had defective hearing, and 14 had skin trouble.

The nurse has made at least one mother very happy, for a baby which was very ill, is now well through her help.

Miss Walker found the baby suffering from indigestion and a large boil on its chest. She brought the child to town and had it cared for until a formula could be found which would agree with it.
