The Portland Exposition Quartet will sing at the Liberty Theatre tonight. Two former citizens of Hillsboro, Miss Georgia Baldwin, soprano, and Geo. D. Ingram, tenor, are members of the quartet, and both are well known in Hillsboro and vicinity. Miss Baldwin always charmed her hearers when she attended high school in this city, but since her departure she has greatly improved, and she is now recognized as one of the best sopranos in the northwest. Mr. Ingram, who was superintendent of music for the Hillsboro schools when here, has served several years as supervisor of music in Portland, Washington and Lincoln high schools, where it takes merit to hold so responsible a position. He will appear in his humorous and entertaining production, "Musical Oddities." Other members of the quartet are Vera Shaver, contralto, graduate of University of Oregon, and William Fraser Robertson, basso for a number of years with Savage English Grand Opera Company. Mrs. Alvina Knowles, one of Portland's brilliant pianists, is the accompanist.
