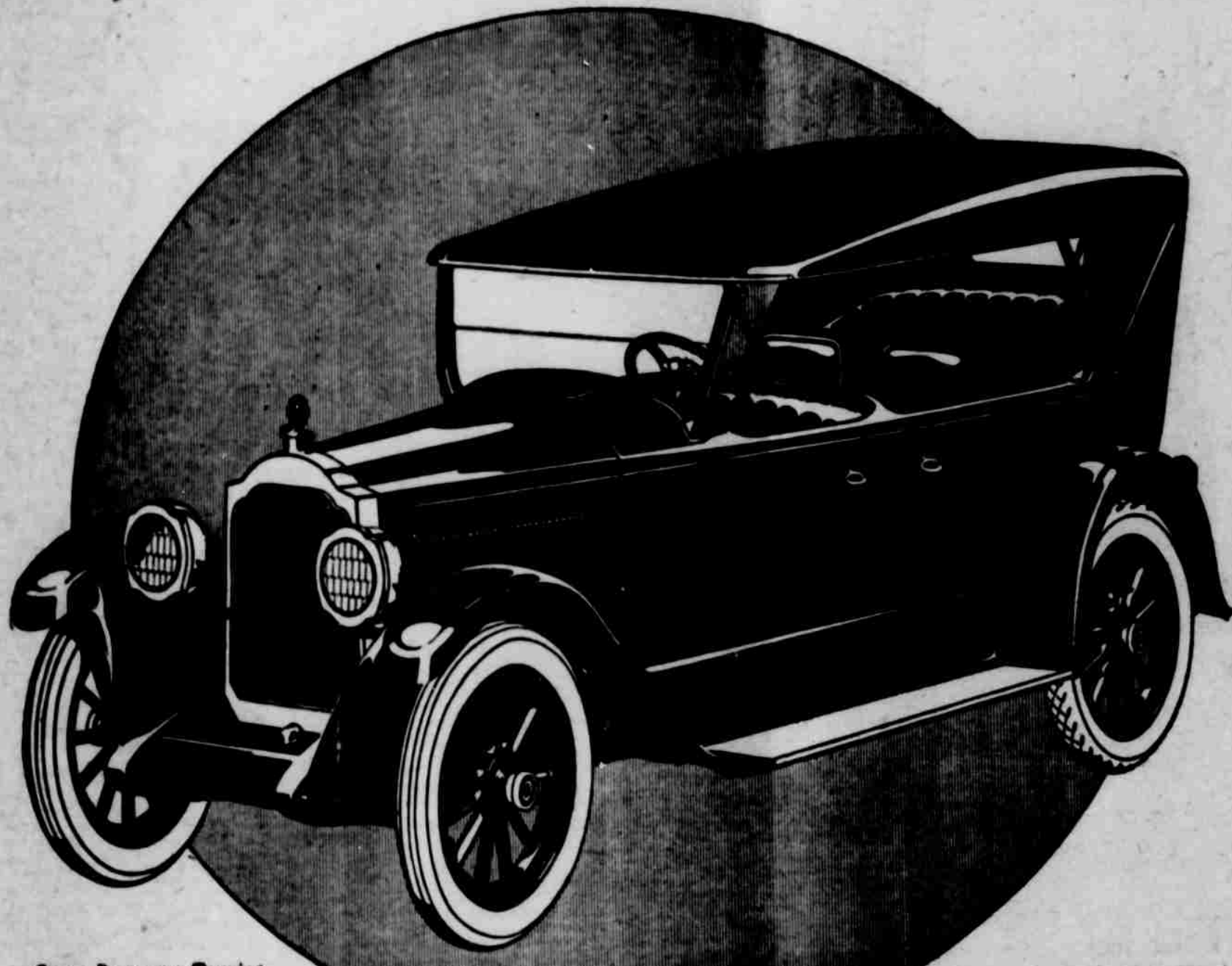

Logging Operations Suspend in
Mountains, Northwest

NEW SNOW LAST OF WEEK

E. J. Sherman to Install a Lath
Mill

New snow in the mountains practically suspended logging in the majority of the P. R. & N. camps the last of the week, and the log trains were cancelled for several days.

E. J. Sherman, who has started his logging camps and sawmill in South Tualatin, will operate a lath machine as a by-product plant.

State Industrial—

Siletz spruce sawmill to be operated by Philomath Lumber Co.

Bend — Brooks-Scanlon mill shipped 7,000,000 feet in March, and with Sherwin-Hixon Co. cut 20,000,000 feet that month.

Tillamook—Wheeler sawmill at Cochran, closed since November, to re-open May 1.

Eugene gets factory to make stock and poultry feed.

Pacific Telephone Co. planning new trunk line from Eugene to Roseburg.

Prineville—R. H. Jones, formerly of Beaverton, takes over Central Oregonian.

Forest Service to build 800 miles of road in 1923, costing \$281,000, 434 miles trail and three bridges. Total of \$418,000 will be spent.

North Bend—150 men employed here loading ships.

Pilot Rock has cut teachers' salaries \$10 a month flat.

Reedsport to build 100 new houses this year.

Pacific states industries at Bunker Hill to be electrified.

Union Pacific cuts fares to North Beach points about one-half.

Oregon Electric may be extended from Eugene to Springfield.

Astoria effects a saving of \$11,000 in teachers' salaries.

American Legion builds swimming tank at Redmond—dance hall at North Bend.

North Bend—South inlet gravel found rich in gold.

Roseburg-Coos Bay highway to be finished this year.

Roseburg—\$100,000 apartment house to be erected here in near future.

Eugene—Contract to be let for addition to Osborne hotel.

Astoria—\$42,804 was expended here during 1921 for building purposes.

Klamath Falls—\$150,000 appropriation made to fight pine beetle pest, 200 men to be employed.

Eugene—Construction to start on new \$60,000 plant of Eugene Farmers' Creamery.

Sherwood votes \$12,000 bond issue for purchase and improvement of water plant.

Klamath Falls—Development of 20,000 acres of land in Fort Klamath section of Klamath county planned.

Philomath—With coming of spring, smaller lumber concerns here resume operations.

Glide votes \$25,000 school bond issue.

The Dalles—Transfer of O. W. R. & N. Co.'s tie-treating plant at Wyeth to this city means another annual payroll of from \$125,000 to \$150,000.

Astoria—Standard Oil Co. to erect \$1,000 public comfort station.

Walla Walla — \$47,500 school bonds sold; construction of new building to start at once.

Eugene—New 2-story business block will be constructed here at cost of \$125,000.

Oregon City—Odd Fellows to erect \$30,000 lodge building.

Eugene Fruit Growers' Assn. closes prune pool, netting \$100,000 to growers. To erect new fruit packing house at Creswell.

Stayton—\$50,000 in improvements being made in woolen mills here; will triple capacity of concern.

Fairlie City to have new tourist camp ground.
