BIG PRIMARY ON TOMORROW MORNING

State and County Candidates Finish Their Campaign This Evening

OLCOTT OR HALL TO WIN

Friends of the Governor Think He has the Lead

The big primary battle is on this Friday, May 19. O. O. Fithian is contesting Ralph E. Williams for Republican National Committeeman, and the fight is a warm one. For Congress, Hawley has Earl Fisher, of this county, and A. W. Norblad, Astoria, as opponents. Hawley looks like the winner.

The Republican fight for Governor goes apace and many think Olcott has the inside track, being present incumbent. Hall will be his closest opponent as the situation looks tonight, and Hall's supporters say they will put him over. But Olcott's friends are equally confident that the present Governor will win. I. L. Patterson, of Polk county, is still fighting hard for honors, but to the outsider his chances appear third—but you never can tell, for Patterson is a campaigner and has lots of strength. The candidates of J. D. Lee, Louis Bean and Geo. White appear negligible.

Burnett and McCourt will doubtless land the supreme court nominations on the dominant ticket, with Geo. Shepherd and his "forty-foot channel" trailing in the also-rans.

Geo. R. Bagley, circuit judge, Hillsboro, has no opposition.

L. M. Graham is the only candidate for the legislature who has his name printed on the Republican ballot. Three may be nominated, the other two by writing in. The aspirants are M. H. Stevenson, Harley C. Peterson, Ed. Schulmerich, Hillsboro; L. M. Hesse, Scholls, and B. B. Reeves, Cedar Mill.

It is a known fact that Farm Bureau members and others will write names on the primary legislative tickets as follows:

On the republican ticket—L. M. Hesse, Wm. Schulmerich and L. L. Crawford, and on the democratic ticket the names of L. L. Crawford, Wm. Schulmerich and J. C. Leedy.

For county commissioner the Republican candidates are John Ireland, present incumbent by appointment, Forest Grove; A. F. Baker, of the same city, and Geo. McGraw, of Banks. No one appears to want to predict the outcome, each of the trio being confident of his election.

The Democrats—There are three democrats running for the governorship. They are Walter Pierce, Union county; Webster Holmes, of Tillamook, and Harvey Starkweather, of Portland.

For the legislative ticket voters will write in the names of three, and two candidates are B. B. Reeves and Ed. Schulmerich.

Judging from what one hears the recall of Williams and Buchtel is going to be a horse race.

TRACK AND FIELD MEET

The Annual Washington County Track and Field Meet, held on Pacific University Athletic Field, Saturday, May 6, was a success from every standpoint.

By nine o'clock the campus presented a gala appearance, as the contestants with their friends and adherents began to arrive from all parts of the county. At ten o'clock the schedule of events for grade schools, began. Much interest and enthusiasm was shown. Hillsboro Grade School with 41 points in their favor walked off with the big pennant for "points." Cornelius was a close second with 35 points, and Metzger came third with 31 points. At noon basket dinners were spread on the tables provided for that purpose. Hot coffee, furnished by the merchants of the town, proved a welcome addition to the dinner.

In the afternoon the high school events attracted keen interest. The high schools were divided into two classes, Class A and Class B. Class A consisted of all high schools with an enrollment of over 50 or less. Forest Grove high school, with 88 points to their credit, won the beautiful silver cup, awarded by Pacific University to the high school in Class A with most points. Hillsboro came second, with 64 points. The Washington County Track and Field Meet Association presented a silver cup to the winning high school in Class B. This was awarded to Huston high school, which had 88 points. Gaston came second with 66 points to its credit.

In connection with the Meet, an oratorical and declamatory contest was held in the evening at Marsh Hall. Beaverton won first place in Class A and Hillsboro won second place.

The success of the Meet was largely due to the untiring efforts of the committee in charge, and to the efficient handling of events by Coach Frank, and the Pacific University students, who so ably assisted him.

EX-MAYOR TALBOT DIES AT CORNELIUS

Highly Respected Citizen Succumbs to Month of Illness

WORKED YEARS FOR S. P. CO

Prominent as Pythian and in Work of Cornelius Schools

Thomas Talbot, well known and highly respected citizen of Cornelius, and for over a quarter of a century prominent as a Knight of Pythias and Odd Fellow, died at his home in the midway city Tuesday morning, May 16, 1922, after a month of illness.

Mr. Talbot was born in Norton, England, August 3, 1844, and came to the United States in 1887, where he married in the East. Two children survive by that marriage—William Talbot, a prominent railroad man at Hanna, Indiana, and a daughter, E. E. of Chicago, now visiting in Florida.

He came to Oregon about 1874, and at once went to work for the Southern Pacific Co. as foreman,

holding a position with them until he retired to take care of his private interests.

He was united in marriage to Fannie Neep, at Cornelius, Dec. 3, 1878, the wife dying April 20, 1900.

On April 9, 1902, he was united in marriage to Miss Annie Peters, of Cornelius, the widow and two children, Lester, aged 19, and Helen, aged 14, surviving.

Mrs. Caroline Merrill, wife of J. B. Merrill, of Cornelius, is a sister.

Mr. Talbot has always been actively identified with the school management in his town for many years and he is a past chancellor of Simonides Lodge, Cornelius, and has represented his lodge in the Grand Lodge several times. He was a Veteran Pythian and also a Veteran Odd Fellow, having joined Gaston lodge in the eighties.

He served as Mayor of Cornelius and was always progressive in civic work. He leaves a considerable estate and his home on the main street is one of the nicest places in the city.

The funeral took place this morning at ten o'clock from the Talbot home, under the auspices of Simonides Lodge K. of P., the services being conducted by the M. E. pastor.

Talbot was a man of strong personality, was well educated and widely read and his business judgment was especially fine. He was a man who made warm friendships and held them to the last.

Politically he was an uncompromising democrat.

A host of friends regret his demise and tender the stricken family their deepest sympathy.

The floral tributes from friends and the organizations to which he belonged were profuse and beautiful. Interment was in the Cornelius cemetery.
