FARMERS' FIELD DAY

On June 10th the Washington county farmers are invited to take part in a field day at the Experiment Station at Corvallis. The following are some of the things to be seen on this trip:

Crops work to be observed—

1. Spring wheat variety trials showing Huston, Blue Chaff Club, and Defiance (the recommended varieties for Willamette Valley conditions) being grown alongside of Marquis, Rink, and Jenkins Club.

2. Winter wheat variety trials showing White Winter and Foisy (the recommended varieties) being grown alongside of Kinney, Surprise, Forty Fold, and Hybrid 128.

3. A four-year-old alfalfa field growing vigorously on river bottom soil.

4. Hungarian vetch, a hardy variety, description of which is given on the last page of the May Extension Service News.

5. Demonstrations of different methods used in cutting seed potatoes.

Work in Horticulture—

1. Fifteen new varieties of strawberries, among which are several very promising seedlings.

2. Cherry breeding work, showing some new promising seedlings with one parent known. These cherries should be almost ready to harvest in June.

3. Filbert propagation, showing different methods of handling the bush, and pollination studies.

4. Work on pruning being done by Dr. Harvey and Mr. Murneck. This experimental work is designed to show the vegetative response as a result of various methods of handling leaf and fruit spurs.

5. Horticultural by-product work being carried on by Prof. E. H. Weigand.

Work in Soils—

1. Observation of a white land field which has been tilled in recent years.

2. Rotation experiments, showing the effect of manure in the rotation on Winter wheat, especially on the irrigated plots.

3. The effect of lime on Winter grain in the rotation plot.
