The will of the late William Wright Bagley, pioneer hopgrower, was filed in probate yesterday morning. The estate, according to the petition, consists of \$6,000 in realty, and personal property valued at around \$50,000...

The instrument was signed Nov. 13, 1917, and the legacies are to Elizabeth Bagley, \$1; to Lillie Hanley, \$1; to H. T. Bagley (now deceased) \$1; to Nellie Hoard, \$1; to William H. Bagley, the eldest son, and to George R. Bagley, circuit judge, the residue of the estate is divided share and share alike...

William H. Bagley and Geo. R. Bagley are named as joint executors and they have qualified. Cal. Jack Jr., C. W. Redmond and Thos. Connell were named as appraisers, by Judge Goodin, yesterday.
