GOVERNOR OLCOTT CARRIES COUNTY

Takes Lead Over Hall, Official Count, by 313—Patterson Second
FISHER MAKES GOOD RUN
Beaverton Man Runs Behind Hawley in County—Only by 187

The official vote, as canvassed by Deputy Clerk Luce, L. A. Jackson and D. R. Wheeler, was completed so far as the state and county tickets were concerned, by Saturday night, and the results afforded some surprises. One of these was the fact that Ben Olcott carried the county over Hall by 313, and that I. L. Patterson was second. It was expected that Patterson would carry the county, and that Hall would be second in the running.

The other surprise was the defeat of John Ireland, county commissioner, by A. F. Baker, of Forest Grove.

Public Service Commission—
Both Williams and Buchtel, of the State Public Service Commission, were recalled by a two to one vote in the county, and the recall extended all over the state.

Kerrigan and McCoy have been elected. There were two candidates against Buchtel, which divided the vote. Had there been two or three more Buchtel would doubtless been recalled and then re-elected to fill out the recalled term. With the Williams recall there was but one candidate, Kerrigan.

Ralph E. Williams defeated Fithian for National Committeeman; Hawley gets the congressional nomination by over ten thousand; Olcott is nominated over Hall by about 400; Patterson carried but two counties, his own, Polk, and Yamhill, and was third in the gubernatorial race.

Hoff was renominated for state treasurer; Geo. H. Burnett, John McCourt and J. L. Rand were named for supreme judges. Churchill, with no opposition, was named for Superintendent of Public Instruction; Gram was the winner in the labor commission contest; Thos. K. Campbell was nominated over Thieshoff for public service commission, for the coming term. Judge Geo. B. Bagley was nominated for circuit judge for the judicial district comprising this and Tillamook counties.

The democrats nominated Walter Pierce for governor.

Other congressional nominations in the state—Portland, C. N. McArthur on the republican ticket and Sinnott for the Eastern Oregon district.
