DECORATION DAY

With the advent of Decoration Day next Tuesday, the hearts of America's millions will soften with memories of those who are sleeping the long sleep after offering their lives that a republic might endure. A grateful nation will devote a day in tribute to the men who fought that we might have peace as a united nation—fought when section was arrayed against section, and when bitterness was in the hearts of men and despair in the hearts of women. The big fight was won on the side of sanity and liberty, and Tuesday next we pay homage to the sacrifice.

While the day was originally dedicated to those who wore the blue it now has a triple significance. Once again, in 1898, the nation's sons went out and fought for liberty, with a free West Indies and a resurrected Philippines as the ultimate. This added to our illustrious dead—and time, the relentless, has lessened the bivouac of today's Civil and Spanish War Veterans. Then came the deluge—the world war, with its consequent loss of sons. And on Tuesday next we will sense the meaning of patriotism as never before, and the flood of gratitude that will envelop the country will be full assurance that a nation of free people shall not perish from the earth. And with pride we remember that the Spanish and world war veterans were largely the sons and grandsons of the nation's defenders in the dark days of '61-5.
