CIRCUIT COURT

The trial of H. S. Eberly, charged with cruelty to animals, the charge being that he failed to properly feed livestock, resulted in acquittal by a jury last week. He is to pay \$200 and stand paroled on the jail sentence and the balance of the \$300 fine, but must refrain from making or selling, or attempting to sell improper photos.

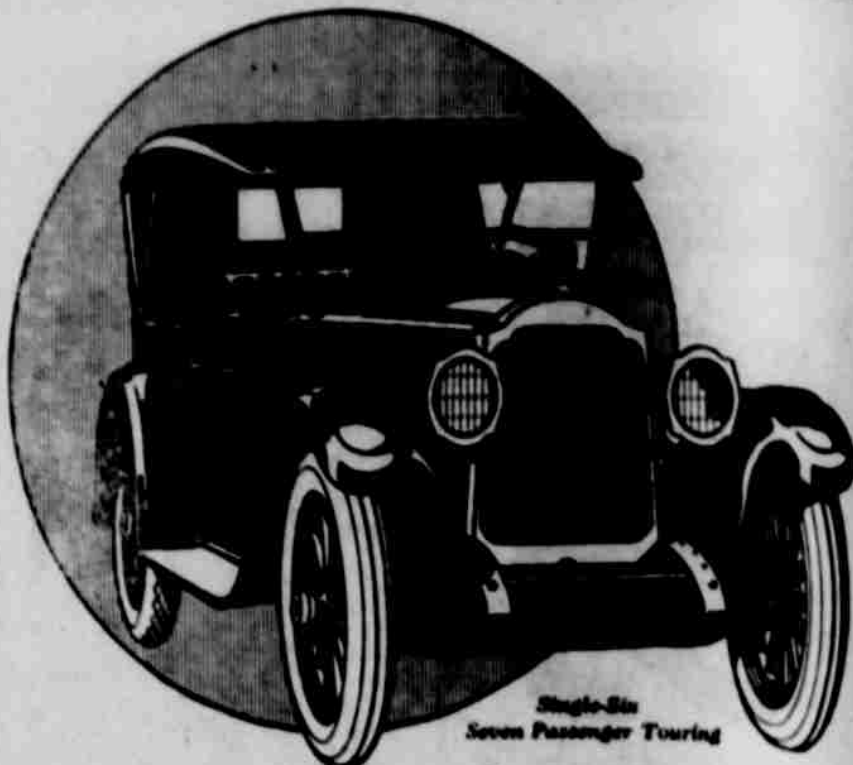
