VETERANS' BUREAU

For the purpose of having every ex-service man in Hillsboro protected by Government Insurance, an intensive drive to secure applications for veterans' insurance amounting to at least \$50,000 will be held here June 12 to 17 inclusive, according to Kenneth L. Cooper, Manager of the United States Veterans' Bureau, at Portland. This amount, if secured, will help swell the state's insurance total, the goal to be striven for being \$2,000,000, he stated.

The campaign is limited to the Pacific Northwest District of the Veterans' Bureau, and it is expected that more than \$5,000,000 in War Risk Insurance will be reinstated or converted by veterans during the week beginning June 12.
