COUNTY AGENT NOTES

Time for 30-day Spray—Because of the rapid advance of the season since the arrival of warm weather, the 30-day spray for codling moth will be due in the Willamette Valley about June 5 to 12. In many instances it will be possible to combine the usual 15-day spray with the 30-day application and save one spraying.

Cherry Slugs Are Busy—Pear and cherry slugs are appearing on the foliage of these trees and are skeletonizing the leaves in characteristic fashion. Growers who experienced serious defoliation from this pest last season may control it by spraying the trees now with arsenate of lead, 2 pounds to the hundred gallons.

Cane Maggots at Work—New tender shoots of raspberry and loganberry are frequently found with their tips blighted and curled down in characteristic "lindber-neck" fashion. A closer examination of the injured cane will reveal a bluish girdle just under the bark at the base of the blighted tip. Cutting into the interior will often show the culprit—a small, whitish maggot within the pith. Infected canes should be cut out way below the girdle and destroyed, as no spray or treatment known at present is effective against this insect.

Rodents—Many farmers who used poison last year and the year before report that they have practically no gray diggers this year, therefore, no necessity for buying poison. It is a good plan, however, to keep a little poison about the place and put out a bait wherever you see a single digger.

More poison is being used this year than last, which means, of course, that many farmers who never used poison before are using it at this time.

The gray digger can still be effectively poisoned at least until the grain begins to ripen. Many farmers put out a good supply of poison in the early part of June.

Poison barley may be obtained at the County Agent's office, or at the usual places of supply in the county.

Moles cannot be poisoned successfully, but traps will get them almost every time if properly set. They multiply slowly, so if thoroughly trapped out once they are not hard to control. One mole will do many dollars worth of damage in a garden or berry field.

In using Barium Carbonate, for poisoning rats, good results have been obtained with hamburger steak, chopped meats, or fish of any kind. The Barium Carbonate is mixed with the bait in the ratio of one part of the poison to four of the bait.

A successful practice is to put the bait out for a couple of nights without the poison. The rats will become accustomed to finding it and will get over being suspicious of it. On the third night the poison is added. A large quantity will be eaten and a good kill will be obtained.

THE USE OF WATER

The North Coast Power Co. has sent out the following rules for the use of water for lawns and gardens, June 1 to October 1:

1. Irrigation and sprinkling rules apply to the use of water during the period 5 to 9 p. m. only, each day.

2. The even numbered houses (those on the south and east sides of the street) may irrigate during this period on the even days of the month only.

3. The odd numbered houses (those on the north and west sides of the street) may irrigate during this period on the odd days of the month only.
