Albany Gets State Encampment Next Year, Portland Withdrawing

HYDE CLOSES HIS YEAR

Retires as Department Commander—Elmer Lundberg Succeeds

Dr. I. W. Hyde returned from Pendleton the first of the week, after presiding as Department Commander, at the session of the Spanish War Veterans' State Encampment, which adjourned last Saturday.

The year has been a fruitful one under Dr. Hyde, and there has been much constructive legislation and action.

Elmer Lundberg, of Portland, succeeds Dr. Hyde as the state executive, and he promises to keep up the good record made the past year. Before adjournment Commander Hyde was presented with a fine Indian blanket by the Pendleton Camp of Spanish War Veterans.

The following resolution was passed at the encampment:

1. That legislation be enacted by the state of Oregon granting bona fide residents thereof, veterans of the wars of April 19th, 1898, to July 4th, 1902, the same rights and privileges as extended to the world war veterans with respect to securing loans from the state.

2. That all civil service examinations where a veteran is taking an examination and rated at the age of 50 years where said veteran is competent and physically able, that he be exempted from said age limit of 50 years and that we urge legislation that will carry this into effect.

3. That legislation be enacted granting to the veterans of the Spanish war the right to fish and hunt without securing a license.

4. That legislation be enacted exempting from taxation the property of our veterans and their widows to the extent of \$1000.

5. That the camps of the state use their best endeavors in securing markers to place on the graves of all deceased comrades not otherwise marked.

6. That we urge our camps to use their best efforts in creating public sentiment that Memorial Day, May 30th, be a day of patriotic memory and service to the departed soldiers, sailors and marines, and nurses of all of our wars, and that business and sports be eliminated.
