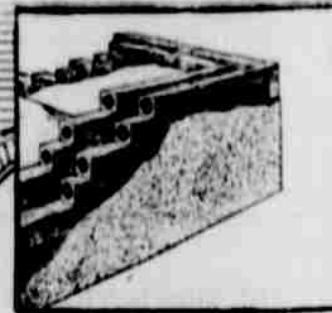
Merchandise for Women

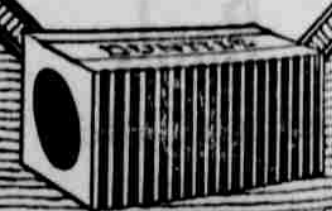
