POISONING GOPHERS

Through arrangements made by County Agent, E. F. Horn, of the U. S. Biological Survey, placed gopher poison on the clover field of the Millard Burnett place near Banks, and a good kill of gophers was obtained.

Powdered strychnine alkaloid over green clover leaves was used. Mr. Horn advises care in selecting just the leafy portion of the clover plant over which the poison is sprinkled, one ounce to ten lbs. of clover leaves. The poison is mixed very thoroughly on each leaf of the clover.

The method of placing the clover is to find gopher workings and to dig through this fresh mound a distance of a foot or so, until the main run-way is reached. A small handful of the leaves is placed in the main run-ways and a clod placed over the opening, after which loose dirt is piled up to complete the closing of the hole. Care should be used that the poison bait thus placed will not be covered with loose dirt. Carelessly placed poison will give poor results.
