EDITOR SUMMER NEWS

O. A. C., Corvallis, Ore., June 27—W. Verne McKinney, of Hillsboro, has been selected as editor of the O. A. C. Summer Session News, published once a week by the students in industrial journalism at the college. APPLE THINNING PAYS

On July 5, at 10 a. m., at the orchard of David Pitt, one mile south of Beaverton, there will be a fruit thinning demonstration of apples. This work will be performed and explained by Clayton L. Long, Extension Horticulturist of O. A. C.

At 1:30 p. m., July 5, at A. B. Thomas' Hill Crest orchard, two and one-half miles southwest of Forest Grove, the same kind of a demonstration will be given.

Last year thinning tests in the J. F. Slover orchard at Freewater on 12-year-old Winesaps gave a return of \$18.52 per tree where thinned 6 and 7 inches apart, to as low as \$5.87 per tree on the unthinned trees.

Expressed in terms of acres, these figures become almost unbelievable, showing a return of \$812.50 per acre for the thinned fruit as against \$305.50 per acre for the unthinned fruit in the same orchard and same aged trees. The difference was because of the additional high grade fruit produced by thinning.

These demonstrations are for anyone interested in fruit thinning.

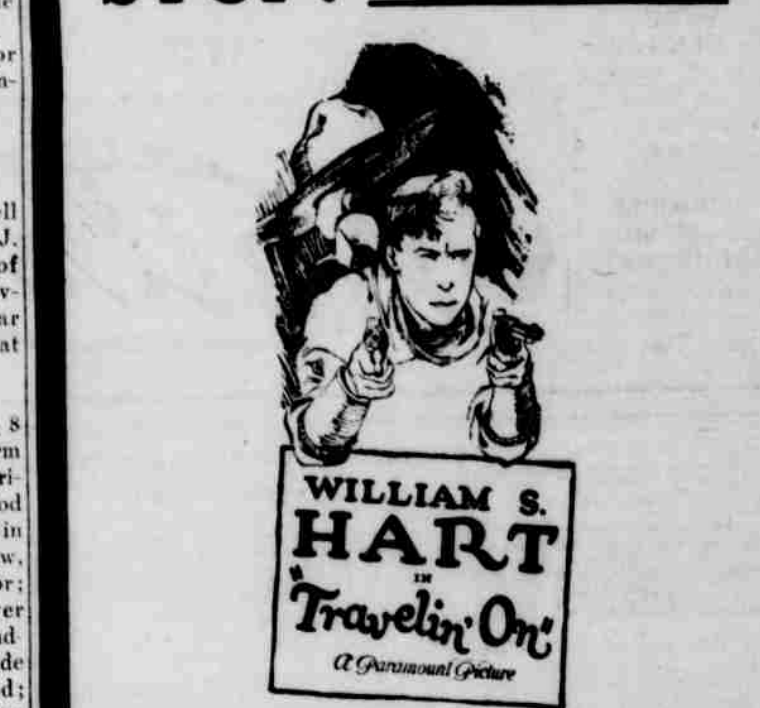
