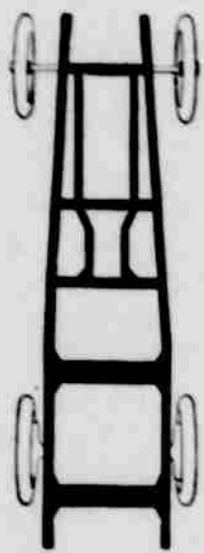


Studebaker Bodies Don't Rattle or Squeak

SUCCESS WITH ALFALFA

"Alfalfa will grow and give good returns when it is treated right," stated Sam Hyre, of Hillsboro, to the County Agent. On the 30th day of June, Mr. Hyre cut his second crop of alfalfa, when many farmers were just finishing their clover hay harvest, and it has been a short clover crop at that. The alfalfa referred to will yield approximately 2 tons per acre for the second crop, and the yield was one and one-half tons the first crop. A third crop will be cut this fall.

Mr. Hyre's method of growing alfalfa is to select well drained land with an open subsoil. Alfalfa is seeded without a nurse crop only on land that has had a cultivated crop on it the previous year. Ground limestone is spread upon the land preferably at the rate of about 3000 pounds per acre.

The important item is to get the Grimm variety of alfalfa seed. This seed is inoculated with a culture carrying the nitrifying bacteria which grow on alfalfa.

During the first season weeds must be kept down. If the alfalfa is seeded in 8 to 10 rows it may be cultivated with a hand cultivator, but if broadcasted the weeds can be pulled by hand.

Mr. Hyre makes it a rule to seed a small piece of ground each season. After the first year the alfalfa may be cultivated in the fall and spring with horse drawn machinery to keep out foreign grasses and weeds.
