FIRE LOSSES

The State Fire Marshal's report for the year ending March 31, 1922, shows that there were 53 fire losses in Washington county. The insurance companies paid \$115,892.29 to the owners of the property. Fourteen of the losses were caused by rubbish and sparks and fourteen were classified as unknown as to origin. One fire loss was incendiary, that of the Mockley property in Forest Grove, which was saved, with but slight damage. Martin Mockley Sr. and Martin Mockley Jr. and John Posey, all of the Grove, pleaded guilty before Judge Bagley recently.

BIG SUIT FILED

Andrew England and W. W. Mellar, doing business as real estate dealers, have sued I. S. Ramsey, of Groveland, for \$1,000, real estate commission. The complaint alleges they had a writing and agreement to sell the Ramsey place for \$22,500. That they were to have one thousand dollars commission and that Ramsey sold the place to a man to whom they had shown the place as a prospective buyer and Ramsey now refuses to settle the commission.
