Payrolls make a town, be they large or small. Too few people appreciate the fact that the many families here by virtue of the Tillamook line; the employment of people at the condenser and at the sawmill, has done much to make the town bigger and better, and to augment this the hundreds hired at the cannery during the summer months help wonderfully. The sooner men with capital realize that payrolls are the thing the sooner Hillsboro will grow.

When one realizes the fact that several hundred women and young people are given employment at the cannery each year, putting in circulation thousands of dollars, the value of the cannery to the community becomes more than apparent. And small fruit farming is what does the work. The object lesson is enough to warrant a much greater acreage—ten times the acreage, or more and that would mean a much greater Hillsboro district.

Quite a few country newspapers are agitated over the proposed income tax. Funny, isn't it, that newspaper men worry about troubles of this kind, which rarely come to the newspaper office. VALUE OF CLUB

The question has often been asked: "What is the value of the rabbit club work as compared with the raising of livestock, and the judging work done in such projects?"

When the stock club members assembled at the O. A. C. pavilion on the 23rd of June, to take part in the judging work of the eight classes there was a rabbit club boy amongst them that the stock boys regarded with question. Why? Because he was not a livestock club member, but a rabbit raiser, and they felt that there was too great a difference between the two for him to be a real competitor in the club contest at the final try-out at the summer school at the college at O. A. C.

Remembering to look for the main essential points the same as he had been taught to look for in the rabbit judging and having heard the instructors talk during the two weeks' school, Ralph Hardman, the owner of a registered class A New Zealand rabbit and an active member of the Tigard Registered Rabbit Club, scored 635 points out of a possible 800 points, and tied for third place out of 150 contestants.

We believe that this thoroughly demonstrates that the rabbit is not "Pet Stock," but small live stock, and that it should be so classified and recognized—not as a pet but as a real animal that is to play an important part in the food supply of the state and nation; and that a lesson that applies to one class of stock can be applied to the other.

Washington county has reason to be proud of this record and to uphold it this Fall at all the stock judging contests held at the different fairs, not with a rabbit club boy, as he is not eligible to judge in the stock contests, but with a picked team from the many good stock clubs that have been organized. Can the stock clubs do less than the record set by this boy for them to equal or excel.

The value of club work has been recognized by all of our fair boards all over the country, and the ribbons and premiums offered are evidence that club work has a recognized place in the life of every man, woman and child, not only in Oregon, but throughout the whole world.
