TRAINING CAMP

Camp Lewis, Washington, August 7.—With every facility of the biggest army camp in the United States placed at their disposal for instruction and entertainment, four young men from Hillsboro and vicinity have completed their first week at the Citizens' Military Training Camp at this place. Among them are Edward E. Cox, formerly 805 Broadway, now of Orenco; Geo. L. Thompson, 612 Sixth St.; Claude G. Erwin, Oak Park; Roland H. Hornecker, Leisville, and Thos. A. Davis, son of T. R. Davis.

Instruction began with fundamentals for the Red, or beginning course, while the White (second year) and Blue (third year) courses started out with advanced work.

A former K. C. hut has been fitted out as recreation room and post exchange, with three pool tables, a piano, reading and writing material, wrestling mat, and "bean soup" easy chairs. With a log fire going in the big brick fireplace, the recreation room was extensively patronized from the start, and the post exchange, profits from which go to entertainment of the students, did a thriving business in doughnuts and other refreshments, the digestibility of which had been previously passed on and guaranteed by the camp surgeon.

Baseball, gloves, bats, boxing gloves, volley balls and other athletic equipment was issued the afternoon of the first day the students were in camp, and last Saturday afternoon the companies organized baseball teams and selected their boxing and wrestling representatives. Athletics will not be confined to the members of the teams, however, for every student attending will be compelled to take part in the "mass games" and general sports. This is made possible by the fact that all have undergone a thorough physical examination, and everyone attending the camp is known to be "fit." Primary emphasis throughout will be laid to developing these selected youths physically.
