ORENCO GOPHER TEST

A demonstration of methods of mixing strychnine and clover, and of placing same as a bait for gophers, will be given Saturday, August 19, at 2:00 p. m., on a piece of meadow land at the rear of the M. McDonald residence, at Orenco.

The demonstration, which was arranged for by the county agent, through the courtesy of C. R. Rich, manager of the Orenco orchards, will be in charge of A. W. Moore, Biological Assistant of the U. S. D. A.

Splendid results have been obtained through the use of this new method of poisoning gophers. The advantages over trapping are speedier and more effective results.

The demonstration is open to the public.
