MRS. SARAH J. R. FINDLEY

Mrs. Sarah Jane Reeves Findley, who died at Cedar Mills, Thursday, August 10, 1922, was born in Carroll county, Missouri, October 10, 1842. She crossed the plains to Oregon with her parents in 1852, and the family settled near Kerbyville, Josephine county, and endured the privations incident to the pioneer life of that date, supplemented by the horrors of almost continuous Indian warfare from 1853 to 1856. A year later the family removed to northern California, and later returned to Oregon, living a short time in Washington and Marion counties. On February 14, 1859, she was married to Alexander B. Findley, at St. Paul, in the latter county, and four years later the young couple went to Grand Ronde valley. In 1872, Mr. and Mrs. Findley began farming near Lostine, Walla-walla county, and Mrs. Findley is believed to have been the first white woman in that vicinity. In 1898 they returned to the Willamette valley and made a home at Cedar Mill. The remainder of their lives was spent there. The surviving children are: Henry Ross Findley, Cedar Mill; Mrs. Florence Johnson, Imnaha, Oregon.

Portland to have new \$40,000 wicker furniture store.

Eugene—Phi Delta Theta fraternity to build \$20,000 house.

Hood River to have new \$25,000 co-operative fruit storage plant.

Rainier—Long-Bell Co. goes to eight hours; two big new mills to be built.

Milton Box Company expects to make two million boxes this year.

Portland—Two large modern apartment houses to be constructed here.

Roseburg country club to erect \$4500 club house.

Portland—A \$167,000 blind school to be erected.

Bend—Modoc Lumber Co. to erect 10 dry kilns.

A shipment of 36,000 cans of strawberries to England has been made by the Lebanon cannery.

Clatskanie—State Bank to have \$25,000 home.

Reedsport—I. O. O. F. Lodge to erect lodge room and hall here soon.

Hood River—Lost Lake Highway, just outside the border of the Oregon National Forest, is opened.

Hood River—Two contracts let for surfacing Mt. Hood loop.

Port Orford—New lumber mill to be built on lake here.

Marshfield—\$30,000 community building may be erected soon.

Eugene—University of Oregon buildings destroyed by fire recently to be replaced at once; new structures to cost between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

Medford—Brownlee-Olds Lumber company will make first run at its new mill here this month.

Hillsboro—A \$30,000 Masonic temple to be erected.

Corbett—A \$30,000 union high school building to be erected.

Wendling—Work to start on new mill, to replace one destroyed by fire.

Manpon to have new hotel to replace the one destroyed by fire last year.

Marshfield—Odd Fellows to have new home here.

New hotel completed at Madras.

Astoria—New hotel to be erected in short time.

Vernonia now has a railroad.

Big spruce mill at Toledo now operating.

Willamina now has a wall built reservoir of 200,000 gallons capacity, full of water. Bonds for \$15,000 to be used for repairing and improving the city water system.

Medford—\$400,000 to be spent on Eagle Point irrigation project.

Condon—New concrete store building to be erected.

Prairie City—Dixie Meadows mill to resume operations.

Coquille—New bridge over Coquille river now completed, by J. S. and Peter Lorsche.

DISABLED VETERANS

For the purpose of securing employment for disabled war veterans who have been rehabilitated vocationally, a campaign will be conducted throughout the north-west August 21 to 26, by the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, according to A. E. McCabe, district head of the newly organized employment section of the bureau. More than 900 veterans of Washington, Oregon and Idaho have completed their training courses and several hundred more are scheduled to finish their vocational work within the next two or three months, he stated.

"These fellows who could not carry on their pre-war vocations because of war injuries surely deserve consideration in the matter of employment," said Mr. McCabe. "They have struggled for months and in many cases years to master a new occupation. However, we are not asking employers to hire these veterans for sentimental reasons, but rather because they are now capable of

Catholic Citizenship

ARTICLE SIX

Because Catholic Moral Principles affect the integrity of Catholic Citizenship, therefore a brief digest of them is here given. After knowing these Catholic FUNDAMENTALS, fair-minded persons will instinctively recognize the falsity of a thousand and one pernicious charges attributed to Catholic citizens and institutions.

CATHOLIC MORAL PRINCIPLE NO. 1

MARRIED PERSONS: Those who contract lawful Christian marriage are joined by an unbreakable bond, which only death can divorce. For grave reasons, a Catholic may live apart from husband or wife, even secure legal divorce, but attempted remarriage while the other party lives, excludes them from the sacraments of the Church. Infidelity, race suicide, abortion are held to be intrinsically evil.

CATHOLIC MORAL PRINCIPLE NO. 2

UNMARRIED PERSONS, both men and women; there is no double standard. Not only the wicked things mentioned by St. Paul in I Cor. 6, 9 and 10; Ephesians 5-3, but even the willful desire of them are grievous or mortal sins. And Catholic theology teaches that to leave this life without due repentance for even one mortal sin, bars the soul from heaven forever.

CATHOLIC MORAL PRINCIPLE NO. 3

PRIESTS, BISHOPS, THE POPE are not only bound by ALL the laws included in Moral Principle No. 2 (for single persons) but since they take a solemn VOW of perpetual chastity and celibacy, therefore any violation of the above strict moral code would be a double sin for them: (1) against the universal law of God and (2) against their vow, explicitly and freely taken.

CATHOLIC MORAL PRINCIPLE NO. 4

THE RELIGIOUS WOMEN, I. e., NUNS OR SISTERS, are bound by ALL the laws by which any other pure Catholic girl or woman is obligated, according to above principle TWO, but in addition to this, she is also bound by her vow of chastity or purity taken when dedicating herself to God. This vow includes the promise to remain unmarried. The Sisters, however,

CAN SECURE DISPENSATION FROM THEIR VOWS if they desire, to return to worldly pursuits and even marry, without incurring moral censure.

THERE ARE NO LOCKED-UP OR ESCAPED NUNS

In the sense our enemies assert, since no girl is accepted into a sisterhood unless she ardently desires it and from the highest spiritual motives; nor need one remain against her will; the Canon Laws of the Church are rigorous and most explicit in safeguarding her fullest liberty. If in an ALMOST IMPOSSIBLE SITUATION, these laws were ever violated in an individual case, we ask: What law of God, man, state or church is immune from all possible infraction? Hence, no one need "escape"—the door, figuratively speaking, is always open from the inside. Of course, though they CAN do so, they are NOT SUPPOSED to leave like a thief in the night, but notify their superiors and be dispensed or excused from their voluntary promises. Just as if a man enlisted in the army, wished to leave before his enlistment expired, he would not simply walk out, but must have permission. In the army this would rarely be given, but in the Sisterhoods it is always granted when properly requested.

TO THE ABOVE FOUR CATHOLIC MORAL PRINCIPLES THERE ARE NO QUALIFICATIONS, NOR EXEMPTIONS, NOR EXCEPTIONS. THEY BIND POPE, BISHOP, PRIEST, LAYTY, MEN AND WOMEN, each according to his own state of life, as above outlined.

There may be the occasional priest who proves faithless to his self-imposed vows. As there are fallen angels, fallen apostles, fallen ministers, preachers, so there is the occasional unworthy priest. But the publicity given the latter clearly proves their rarity.

At times, also, one of the religious women or Sisters will forsake her high ideals. Human nature is always the same. Wrong may at times be done under the garb of religion, NOT BECAUSE OF THE SYSTEM, but because of the individual; NOT BECAUSE THE CHURCH'S LAWS WERE KEPT, BUT BECAUSE THEY WERE BROKEN.

THERE IS BUT ONE OBJECT OR PURPOSE

for which the Catholic Sisterhoods exist; to serve God better and mankind more efficiently. Their noble, saintly lives of sacrifice, their heroic works of charity and mercy fully vindicate these their aims and ideals.

JUDGE, THEN, THE MORAL UGLINESS

of those who slander the stainless, innocent Sisters of Charity, Mercy, Religion. If to grossly insult even ONE pure woman is an act of unspeakable iniquity, how designate the crime of doing this to tens of thousands! How delineate persons who prate about "defending pure womanhood," when by falsities which the father of lies might blush to tell, they are blackening the reputation of the purest women that God ever allowed craven humans to insult.
