ACCLIMATED CORN

Those who grow corn and depend on purchasing their seed each year, might do well to look about at the splendid fields of corn in the county this season, with a view to selecting the farmer from whom they will purchase seed for the 1923 crop.

The crops this year are grown from seed secured from two sources. The first from acclimated seed, and the second from seed not acclimated to this region. The former seed has grown, generally speaking, a well matured ear of corn with a fair amount of foliage, while the unacclimated seed has grown tall stalks with a more or less poor ear of corn. There may be an exception or so to this statement, but generally it is true.

The corn field which at this time has ears matured or well along to maturity is worth much more for silage because of its increased feeding value over immature corn. This fact is too well established to need discussion.

Among the finest fields of corn, as far as general utility purposes are concerned, is one of J. J. Van Kleek's, of Scholls. It would pay any admirer of good corn to visit that field of Minnesota No. 13. Much of this corn is ripened enough for grain.

The county agent this year arranged with thirty-five farmers for tests of certain varieties of corn. While Ross' Dent, Golden Glow, and other varieties have given fine results, there is here in this county acclimated seed which is perhaps superior, but it has never been saved in sufficient quantities to supply local demands.

The corn bought in 1921, by the Shute Bank, is giving splendid results, and seed from that variety should be saved for local use.

A good crop of well matured corn for silage will help cut the feed bills. The less well matured

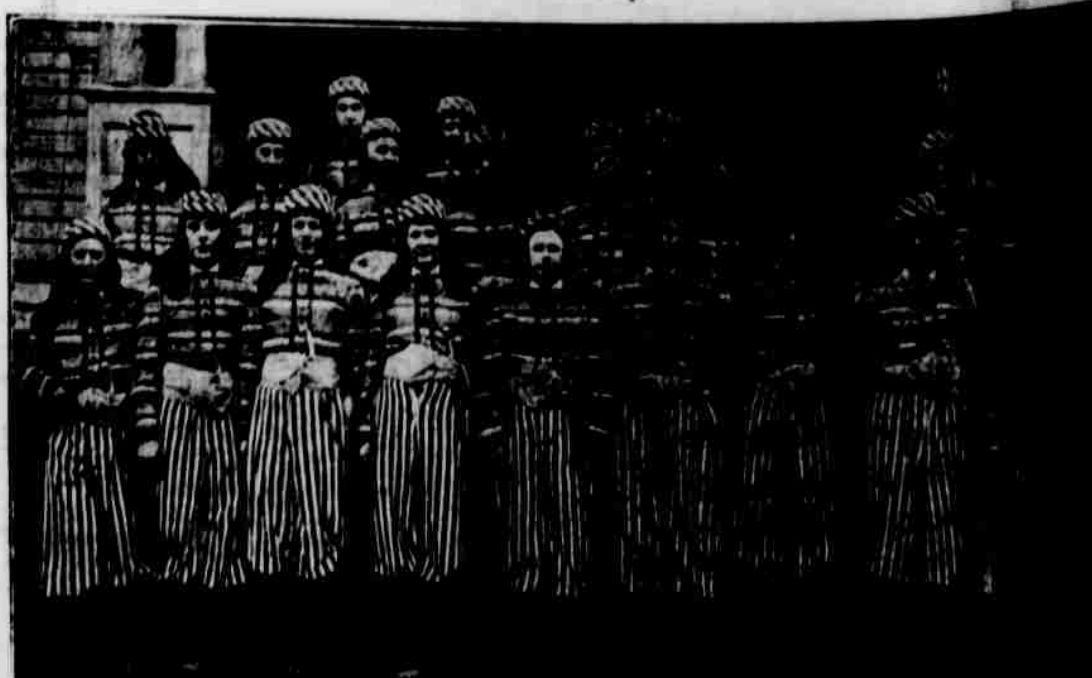
After the wedding, the happy couple left Spokane for an auto tour of the Northwest, and after October 1 will be at home to their friends at Tillamook.
