O. H. Cobb, for several years a resident of Hillsboro, died at the home of his son, George Cobb, at Nampa, Idaho, October 13, 1922, from an attack of heart trouble, having been in ill health for several months.

Mr. Cobb was born in Pennsylvania, September 21, 1842. Four children survive him—the children of his first wife, George, of Nampa, Idaho; William, of West Stayton, Ore.; Mrs. Minnie Laper, of Harney county, Oregon, and Mrs. Mabel Martin, of near Jefferson, Oregon.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Mrs. A. L. Hinton, to whom he was married eleven years ago in Harney county.

Mr. Cobb was a wagon maker by trade. He was a veteran of the Civil war and was prominent in G. A. R. activities.

He was a great admirer of the Legion boys, and prior to his last illness was attempting to finance a veteran hall for the G. A. R. and Legion. He was a believer in the strictest code of honesty, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

The remains were brought to Hillsboro Monday, and on Tuesday burial followed in the cemetery at Dallas, Polk county, Glenn F. Bell directing.
