POULTRY DEMONSTRATION

Three poultry meeting centers have been selected in Washington county where timely meetings will be held to discuss topics of interest to poultrymen, throughout the coming year.

H. E. Cosby, Poultry Extension Specialist, will discuss with the poultrymen the principles and practices in feeding and management of winter layers at all three of the above named meetings.
