### A WORD FROM INDIA

Baldwin Boys' High School, Bangalore, India, Oct. 19, 1922.

To the Editor—It may be interesting to you and the readers of your paper, and especially to any who are our friends, to have me write concerning a visit we made to Mysore City, which is the capital of the native State of Mysore, one of the largest of these native states in India. It lies about 80 miles south of Bangalore City and has a population of about 75,000.

At about the end of September each year for ten days—nine days this year, on account of an eclipse of the sun—there is a religious festival of the Hindu calendar, at Mysore City, which is attended by thousands of pilgrims, and which in many ways is unique in its ceremonies and displays. It gains prominence because H. H. The Maharaja of Mysore, himself not only fosters the observance of the festival but in a peculiar way becomes a part in it. At the first of the period the Maharaja ascends the throne, and does not leave the palace until the last day of the ceremony.

A small party of us, including some of the teachers and boys from the school, managed to make the journey and to see something of the sights, just in those last few days when the events culminate in things in which the ruler is directly involved. The whole festival is a tool feast—at which time the articles which are used by anyone are held in special reverence and worshipped. The Indian name is "Desara" with many variations of spelling in use.

The palace is an imposing structure surmounted by a large dome of black marble and smaller domes at the corners. While the state is Hindu, its Palace is in point of architecture Moslem. But its full glory is revealed at night when the whole of the building is lighted by thousands of electric lights which outline it in every way, and the whole palace glistens in dazzling light. I have never seen anything more beautiful in lighting effects. A red light in the dome denotes the presence of the Maharaja in the city.

On Friday evening, September 29th, was the big English dinner, or council meeting, at which the British Resident was present, and we might also have had an opportunity of attending if we had made arrangements for tickets in advance. In the court yard were grouped thousands of people, watching wrestling bouts and feats of horsemanship, juggling and the like. The Indian soldier in his bright-colored uniform is a very imposing figure. Many are armed with pikes and long lances, others with guns, and the police with clubs, and they had a hard time keeping the crowd back. But the Desara crowd is a good-natured one.

Saturday afternoon and evening is the big procession. The route begins at the Palace and leads through the town to a troops' reviewing field, where, in addition, certain religious ceremonies are gone through. There were bands with fine music, and infantrymen, and horsemen in great numbers. The finest of all I think was the horse band, which played as they were mounted, and the drummer had a big drum on either side of his horse. Finally came the Maharaja on a great state elephant, with hangings of gold. The Maharaja, with his brother, were seated in the golden howdah, and both were clothed in what appeared to be cloth of gold. The cheering was not so immense as it would have been in an American city, nor was the ruler's response while he was within our view, other than the most formal nod. The return to the Palace at night was one grand glare of lights, which lighted up the whole line. The Maharaja was welcomed by the customary salute of 21 guns.

This seems to be the most matter-of-fact account, but I assure you this trip were thrilling in the extreme. We were able to gain a place of advantage for the procession, and the crowd was immense, and as the hum of voices came to us and the ripple of applause that greeted the Maharaja (for the people do not greet us enthusiastically as we do) we had to ask ourselves, in the light of the times, "What is India thinking about?" Well, I won't try to answer that just yet, but I shall try to write soon about the pilgrims and at least one of the pilgrimages near Mysore during this week of Desara festivities.
