Owing to complications which have developed we have decided to discontinue the giving of flag premiums. Patrons holding more than one-half of the required number of coupons will be given the number necessary to secure a flag, while those having less than one-half may have coupons redeemed at the bakery.

Under the rules of the house supplying the flags coupons could only be given with large leaves, and a rule prevented their being given with leaves sold out of the city. Some people prefer two small leaves to one large leaf, and felt they were entitled to the premiums, while patrons living out of the city felt they were being discriminated against.
