MALINGS GO EAST

Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Maling depart for the East Jan. 4, their objective point being Atlantic City, N. J., where the National Canners Association will hold its annual convention. The Northwest Canners' Association have been apportioned four booths at the big convention, and 80 cases of canned fruits will be shipped from the Northwest. Logans, apples and blackberries will be the varieties on exhibit from the Oregon country, and the Ray-Maling Co. last evening shipped out its quota, sending Logans only. No 2's fancy and No. 10's will make up the offering.

Mr. Maling states that last year there were seven hundred buyers in attendance besides the brokers, and many of the 1922 sales of the local cannery were due to the visit made last year. Mr. Maling will make a special effort to show the worth of the Logans, and the growers of this section are assured that their interests will be projected in the meeting for all they are worth. Mr. and Mrs. Maling will be absent nearly two months.

RAY DILLON WRITES

Ray Dillon, who is at Astoria, writes the Argus:

"Thought perhaps you would like to have some first hand news from the Astoria fire. No one can realize how bad it is until it is witnessed. Practically every business house in the city, excepting one, burned to the ground, as well as a great number of residences. The loss was very heavy as many saved only the clothes they wore. The Red Cross is doing wonderful work, and they have a splendid organization of Boy Scouts. Astoria can be proud of them. We arrived on Saturday, the 4th, and set up our kilchens and fed 475 for supper. On the 13th we fed 2160 for the day, having 909 for dinner alone. So you see we keep busy.

The fire was so hot that in some of the garages the heat burned the fenders and running boards, leaving nothing but the heavier frame pieces. Those who lost their all were provided with clothes by the Relief Committee of the Red Cross and then we of the culinary forces, put the smiles on their faces every day.

Things are gradually readjusting themselves, and we expect to be here until about Christmas time."
