SNOW IN THE HILLS STOPS LOGGING CAMPS

Have Shut Down Until Weather
Warms Up

MAY NOT OPEN TILL SPRING

Next Year Gives Promise of Ore-
gon's Greatest Lumber Cut

Snow in the Coast and Cascade
ranges have stopped the opera-
tions of practically 90 per cent
of the logging camps, and they
will remain "down" until the
weather changes and the snows
disappear. A few camps in the
sheltered districts will continue
their output, but many plants will
not run until Spring opens.

There is every indication that
the 1923 lumber cut will be the
greatest in the history of Oregon.

Industrial Notes

Prineville owns a broad-gauge
railway 19 miles long. It con-

nects with the Oregon-Washing-
ton Railroad and Navigation Co.
and Oregon Trunk Railway at
Prineville Junction. It is oper-
ated by a gasoline motor and is
capable of hauling 10 carloads of
cattle in regular standard stock
cars. It serves the rich cattle
country along Crooked River and
the headwaters of the Deschutes.

Reedsport—Door factory in-
stalling new machinery.

Portland—Permit issued for
building \$80,000 cold storage
warehouse.

Portland—Wells-Fargo build-
ing to be remodeled at cost of
\$100,000.

Portland—In spite of tax su-
pervisors cut of \$94,753, taxes to

General cut proposed in state

erage of \$650,000 yearly for new
plants and service extensions.

pounds.

Record cargo Oregon apples
from Pacific coast to United
Kingdom, 125,000 boxes, shipped.

Salmon pack of Columbia river
district amounted to \$15,000
cases, with average value of \$6.50
a case, or total of \$9,697,500.

Salem—Four canneries have
pack valued at \$8,046,500.

Salem—Court Street Christian
church to erect \$30,000 edifice.

Portland—Western Coopers
Co. to erect \$35,000 warehouse.

Several sawmills to start oper-
ations in Lane county after first
of year.

Oregon City—Willamette river

Rather than miss a football
game at Coaldale, Pa., 10,000
persons remained in their seats
and refused to fight a fire which
destroyed a house on the outskirts
of the town. Appeals were made
for firemen to respond, but not
one moved. Coaldale tied Shen-
andoah 6 to 6, and the insurance
companies paid for the fire.

COUNTY AGENT NOTES

The swine breeders' meetings
planned for this month have been
postponed until January. Feed-
ing, selection, and management of
hogs will be the order of discus-
sions, to be followed by feeding
demonstrations where wanted.
Meetings will be at Laurel,
Scholls and Gales Creek.

The Portland Union Stock
yards are reported as having
spent around six millions for hogs
from outside points this year. The
fact that certain Washington
county farmers continue to raise
hogs year after year means that
they must find some profit in the
business, and the methods of
these producers are worth look-
ing into. If a portion of that six
million dollars can be diverted to
Washington county with profit to
the swine grower, we want that
portion.

A prune grower at Gaston has
offered the use of his prune or-
chard for demonstration work in
controlling the root borer. It is
expected to take advantage of
this offer after the first of the
year.

Assistance may be obtained
from the Oregon Agricultural
College in reconstructing your
prune dryer so as to make use of
the recirculation process. The
capacity of your present dryer
can be almost doubled at a com-
paratively small cost as compared
with the construction of a new
dryer. Claim for a better dried
product is also made.

The success attained by a few
Washington county farmers in

growing alfalfa has created an in-
terest which will lead to other far-
mers planting this crop. Success
is better assured when the Grimm
variety is planted without a nurse
crop on land which has been in a
cultivated crop the year previous.
The seed should be inoculated
with the nitrifying bacteria which
grow on the roots of alfalfa. Cul-
tures secured from the Experi-
mental station may be used for this
purpose.

Watch for the dates of pruning
demonstrations which will be held
in January in the principal fruit
growing districts of the county. It
will be impossible to have a prun-
ing demonstration in each com-
munity making a request for the
same.
