BUDGET MEETING

The county budget meeting will be held in Hillsboro, starting at ten a. m., on Thursday, December 28, in the court house. The taxation to be raised, according to the estimates of the budget committee, amounts to \$375,329.21, aside from the state taxation, which comes from the state tax commission. No one knows exactly what the state tax will be, but it will be enough to make people sit up and take notice. The tax budget, as fixed by the committee, includes \$17,000 for a poor farm building, something that is needed beyond cavil.

The tax budget committee consisted of the county court—the judge and two commissioners—and W. J. McCready, of Forest Grove, who was chairman; H. J. Valentine, secretary, and W. E. Mays, of North Plains.

A detailed list of the expenditures, as compiled by the committee, will be on hand for the perusal of attendants and the usual big crowd is anticipated.
