MARTIN VANDERZANDEN

Martin Vanderzanden, one of the pioneers of the Verboort-Roy section, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Spiering, Dec. 22, 1922. The funeral took place Sunday from the Roy church, at 10:30 a. m.

Deceased was born at Dinter, North Brabant, Holland, March 17, 1840, and came to the United States in 1867, settling at DePere, Wisconsin. He was united in marriage to Mary Ann VanDyke in 1869, and they came to Oregon in 1877, settling in the neighborhood which has been his home 45 years. The wife passed away April 30, 1894, and he was later married to Mrs. Petronella Green. The second wife passed away a few years ago.

Nine children were born to the first union, seven of whom survive, all being residents of that part of Washington county. They are Henry and Peter, of near Roy; William, of Verboort; John and Theodore, of Roy; Mrs. Jos. Spiering, Roy, and Mrs. Charles Spiering, of North Plains.

While Mr. Spiering was self educated he was gifted in many ways, being a good business man. He amassed a comfortable fortune by dint of hard work, and he was a rather versatile writer. As a citizen he was ever alive to the needs of his adopted country and he was held in high esteem by a large circle of friends.

MRS. COLUMBIA DICKERSON

Mrs. Columbia Dickerson, of Cornelius, died Thursday, Dec. 21, 1922. Her maiden name was Houston and she was born in Missouri in 1850, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Houston. She was united in marriage to Silas P. Dickerson, in Cass Co., Missouri, in 1871, and after four years of residence in that county came to Oregon, settling at Salem. The family came to Cornelius in 1893 and that place has since been her home. Her husband, who was a Civil War veteran, died in 1908.

She had been in her usual health on the day before and her death was very sudden, Thursday morning. She was a devoted and loving wife and mother, a kind neighbor, and a patriotic citizen. She is survived by six daughters—Mrs. F. McGinnis, Redlands, Cal.; Mrs. Minnie Devore, San Francisco; Mrs. Geo. Carrick, Richmond, Cal.; Mrs. Zeller Allen, Red Bluff, Cal.; Mrs. William Scott, Oakland, Cal.; Mrs. H. Eddings, Portland, Ore., and four sons—O. E. Dickerson, Portland; Raleigh Dickerson, Seattle, Wn.; Chas. G. Dickerson, of Berkeley, Cal., and Murray Dickerson, of San Diego, Cal.

Funeral services were held at the Cornelius M. E. church, Sunday afternoon, Rev. J. W. Warrell officiating.

SEED BUSINESS BIG

The United States imports as much red and alsike clover seed annually as may be grown on 40,000 acres. If grown in Oregon this would annually bring in 1 1/2 to 2 million dollars for seed and it would mean increased yields of other crops following the clover. How to get stands of clover and how to fertilize and handle the clover successfully for seed will be fully discussed at the farmers' short course beginning January 2, at Corvallis. The demand for clover seed from Oregon is very strong because of its plumpness and high color, and this together with lowering transportation charges by rail, low freight rates to the Atlantic seaboard by boat, and the new tariff on seed, promises much in the future clover seed business.

Washington county is the home of good clover seed.
