PLEA FOR NURSE

Washington county, at the budget meeting last week, voted down the item for the public health nurse. Those interested in public health in the county have expressed themselves as deeply disappointed and ready to do anything that they can to keep this vital work going forward.

Where this work is well organized, the death rate is markedly decreased from year to year. To drop this work now, is to suffer a set-back that will be very hard to overcome. Some children die each year, that might be saved, in every county in the United States where there is not a public health nurse. Do you realize that every physician in this county is doing charity work and charging it to his interest in public welfare? The county is saved thousands of dollars every year by the medical profession because they are willing to do their share. Were these cases sifted out and usual charges made to the county the bill would far exceed the cost of

a sufficient number of nurses to cover the county with public health effort. Pay your bit and keep the nurse on the job and have the full backing of the physicians of the county.

Is it worth fifty cents to you if a child is saved to Washington county and to society? It may be yours. If you have fifty cents worth of practical interest in this matter, become a member of the Washington County Public Health Association. A drive for membership will be put on soon.
