Circuit Court—The case of the State versus Frank Rinck was summarily disposed of last week when the affair was settled out of court after a jury had been sworn and the evidence of two witnesses heard. The case of the State versus Arthur Brooks, one of the lads charged with the larceny of a heater near Banks, last winter, is on trial yesterday and today, with Senator Hare defending the young man. The jury hearing the case—G. W. Andrews, Frank Simpson, M. Waelder, Lillian Losb, W. A. Lindsay, W. W. Jaquith, Albert Toelch, Fred Elligen, J. H. Garrett, P. L. Benefiel, W. T. Sellers, Wm. H. Hunter. The case involved is where three youngsters took a heater to Portland to sell it and were caught red-handed. Young Brooks contends that he had nothing to do with the affair.

Watson, of Hillsboro; Mrs. Vinson, of Portland; Mrs. Lulu Warren, of Gridley, Cal.; and George Vliet, of Alberta, Canada. The funeral arrangements are not perfected.

The Coffee Club members entertained their husbands and invited friends to a luncheon, an annual affair, at the Congregational church, last evening, and about seventy-five were at table. Mrs. L. W.
