GETS CANADIAN THISTLE

William Robb, who bought the August Two place several years ago, found some Canadian thistles on his place, and after several experiments in attempting to eradicate them, he decided to try another remedy. He secured some of the acid thrown away by the Carnation Milk Products Co. after milk had been tested for butter fat. He used this acid, which, of course, had done its work in analyzing butter contents and to his surprise and satisfaction, found that it worked like a charm. It killed the thistle and as it killed he cleaned up by the place. Mr. Robb thinks that with such a remedy there should be no trouble in ridding farm lands of this obnoxious weed. He says it is a "war killer" and is not overly expensive even if purchased direct from chemical companies.

IN OFFICIAL TESTS

A. J. Evers, of Forest Grove, Oregon, has a pure-bred Holstein which recently finished a good record of production and is listed in the official bulletin of tests published by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

In one year Fay Meachthilde Duchess Jewel produced 24775.7 lbs. of milk and 862.03 lbs. of butter, equivalent to 1077.5 lbs. of butter. This cow was 3 years old when freshening.

Malcolm H. Gardner, who has had charge of the Advanced Registry for eighteen years, says that testing of cattle for production is the very foundation of progress of the dairy business. Testing tells the real worth of an animal and after that is known, constructive breeding can be carried on. One of the first questions a breeder asks when purchasing a bull is the production record of his dams.

COUNTY SCHOOL NEWS

One of the biggest school events of the year was the typewriting, spelling and declamation contest held at the Hillsboro high school last Friday. Previous to this event, the thirty had been divided into thirteen sections where preliminary tryouts had been held. The winners at these preliminary tryouts were the contestants for county honors last Friday.

The typewriting contest was a new innovation in this county and aroused keen interest and competition. The large audience sat quiet and interested during the twenty minute contest. The Class A high schools were Leatha Suchman, of Forest Grove, first; Lolita Francis, of Hillsboro, second, and Edith Tatom, of Hillsboro, third. In Class B Eleanor Conant, of Banks, was first and Eldine Berk, of Banks, second.

The old fashioned "spelling down" also aroused much enthusiasm. The winners won their honors by hard work. In Division one, Elmer Johnson, of Hillsboro, won first; Louise Cook, of Gaston, second, and on third place, Fred DeWitt, of Hillsboro, third. In Division two, Elizabeth Thompson, of Hillsboro, won first; George Hoar, of Dilley, won second; Elizabeth Deurr, of Sherwood, won third. In Division three, first place was won by Evelyn Hesse, of District 39, second place by Rodney Sundberg, of Aloha-Huber and third place by Leah Turner, of District 89.

The big event of the afternoon was the declamation contest. The judges had a hard job, for out of the nearly forty contestants, only about ten were mediocre. The rest showed ability above the average. The decision was especially hard to render in Class A high school, but it finally went to Lois Tuttle, of Forest Grove, for first, and to Gerald Barr, of Hillsboro, for second. In Class B, Isabel McLeod, of Gaston, won first place; Fay Daniels, of District 37, second, and Lee Kirby, of Boston, third.

In grade declamation, Division one, Ronald Welsh, of Boston, won first place; Margaret Giehlert, of Tigard, second, and Wilma Tuttle, of Aloha-Huber, third. In Division two, Carl Gehlert, of Tigard, won first prize; Alfred Finell, of Aloha-Huber, second, and Anna Crop, of North Plains, won third. In Division three, Orson Pease, of Boston, won first; Helen Stiles, of Tigard, second, and third place was a tie between Mildred Richards, of District 37, and Eleanor Smith, of District 89. They drew for the ribbon and Mildred Richards was the fortunate one and received the one ribbon for third place, but the points were divided equally between the two districts, as was the case in all ties, and will be counted towards the cup to be presented on field day.
