BEE MEETINGS CALLED

Bee diseases, including "foul brood," have killed large numbers of swarms of bees in Washington county in the past two years. Foul brood must be cleaned up or it will clean out the bees. In other words, foul brood makes a good beekeeper out of a man, or this disease automatically drives him out of the bee business.

Following requests for assistance in managing bees, two demonstration meetings have been arranged as follows: At 9:15 a. m. April 26th, at the farm of Mr. Abadie, located three blocks south of the "Hillsboro" sign which spans the paved highway at the west entrance to Hillsboro.

The second meeting will be held at the "Office of U. S. Cereal Investigation, U. S. Department of Agriculture" at Forest Grove, at 1:30 p. m., April 26th.

H. A. Scullen, bee specialist of the Extension Service of Oregon Agricultural College, will be in charge of these demonstrations. County Agent.
