CLOVER STEM ROT

A disease known as clover stem rot which is causing loss of as high as 25 and 30 per cent in clover fields seeded last year is noted in several parts of Washington County.

H. P. Bars, plant pathologist of the Oregon Experiment Station, says, "It is caused by a fungus which infests the soil and may perhaps be carried with the seed sometimes. It is a disease which gets started in spots in the field and seems to spread most rapidly during the moist weather of late winter and very early spring. As soon as dry, hot, sunny weather conditions develop the disease is checked and may practically disappear."

It is the first year of a clover crop that seems to suffer the most. The Farm Crops department of the Experiment Station here is now testing different strains of clover, and it is hoped that we may find some types which will be resistant to this disease.

There is, at present, no satisfactory method of controlling the trouble. The disease is worse on heavy wet land, and is particular-
