CHRISTIAN LYSTROP
Christian Lystrop, well known at Reedville and Hillsboro, died May 17, 1923, after an invalidism of several years. He was born in Denmark, November 17, 1846, and came to America in 1884. After living a year in Manitoba he came to the Willamette Valley and settled at Reedville, where for several years he was associated with the Ladd & Reed Farm Co's holdings. He was united in marriage to Mary E. Elliott, Sept. 27, 1888. They resided at Reedville for many years, finally moving to Hillsboro. In 1905 he suffered a stroke of paralysis and since that date has been a helpless invalid. He was uncomplaining in his helplessness. He was a member of the Lutheran church. Funeral services were conducted from the Bell chapel, Sunday afternoon, Rev. M. A. Marcy officiating. The body was taken to Portland and rests at the Portland crematorium.
He is survived by his widow who has been his constant nurse during 18 years of his invalidism.

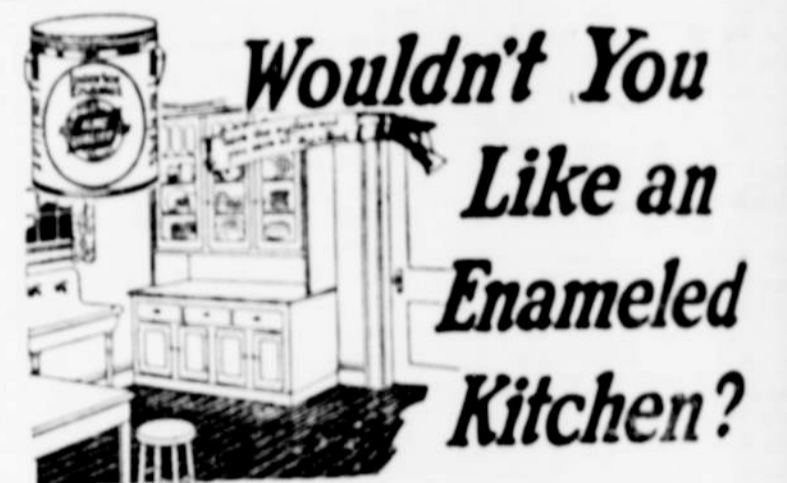
