

CHAMBER NOTES

Chamber of Commerce members at the last meeting heard some interesting addresses by W. Schulmeier, president of the county farm bureau; Mr. Woodruff, master of the local grange, and Geo. Harrow, representing the Grange, on the matter of better business relations between the farmers and business men of the city and establishing better market conditions through co-operation. O. T. McWhorter, county agricultural agent, also outlined the work he was doing, and Dr. Erwin made a few remarks, stating that this was the best county he had been in for years, excelling any locality he had visited since leaving Hillsboro several years ago.

Invitations were extended to the breeders of Jerseys, Guernseys and Holsteins to hold their meetings in the county seat in 1923, the Chamber pledging entertainment.

Dr. J. O. Robb, of the union high school committee, reported on activities of the committee and enough sentiment had been created to make it advisable to circulate petitions to place the matter of a vote before the various districts.

F. J. Sewell dwelt upon the necessity of the business men co-operating with the Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Ass'n, in securing enough pickers for the crop of loganberries, stating there was a scarcity of help. The Chamber will do its utmost to assist in getting the desired labor.
