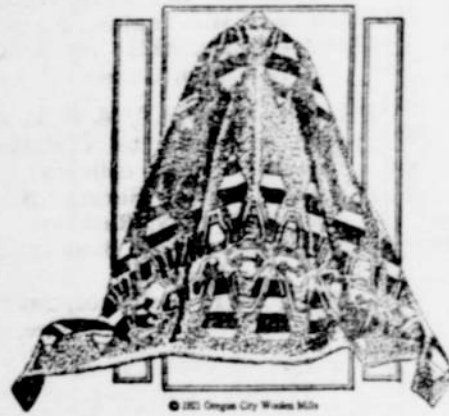

OREGON INDUSTRY

Lumber shipments by water from Portland for six months of 1923 were 219,376,806 feet, valued at \$5,972,706, according to report of Merchants' Exchange. Of this amount 126,847,806 feet, valued at \$3,609,952 went to foreign countries and 92,529,000 feet, valued at \$2,362,754 was shipped to domestic ports.

LIVESTOCK CLUB NOTES

Seventy-eight boys and girls of Washington county are enrolled in livestock clubs. Exhibits of this stock will be made at the local fairs in the county this fall.

Fifty-two boys and girls attended the meeting of the Scholls Calf and Pig clubs at the Chris Koenig farm last week. In addition to a good time there was an illustrated talk given by the county agent on methods of judging and selecting livestock. Chris Koenig and A. B. Flint are the local leaders at Scholls.

Two livestock judging teams will be selected at the county-wide Livestock Judging Contest to be held at the State Fair. One team will compete in contests at the Oregon State Fair and the other at the Pacific International Livestock Show. Any boy or girl in good standing in his or her respective livestock club can compete in the county-wide contest. Suitable prizes will be given.

The Jersey and Holstein Breed Associations of the county plan to give special prizes to calf club winners at local fairs this year.

Harold and Bessie Hathorn and Ted Rutschman, of Laurel, are planning to enter fat pens of four hogs in the contests at the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland in November.

S. C. Inkley, leader of the Banks Calf Club, and W. N. Hathorn, leader of the Laurel Chester White Pig club, are planning practice work in livestock judging for the members of their clubs.
