### COUNTY AGENT NOTES

Four corn entries have been made for the Corn and Potato show to be held October 27, at Hillsboro. Three potato growers have stated their intention to enter for the bushel lot contest. Twelve ears of corn and bushel lot of potatoes will be the amounts required. The premiums will be \$7.50 for first; \$5 for second, and \$2.50 for third prize on both potatoes and corn, and will be provided through the county fair fund.

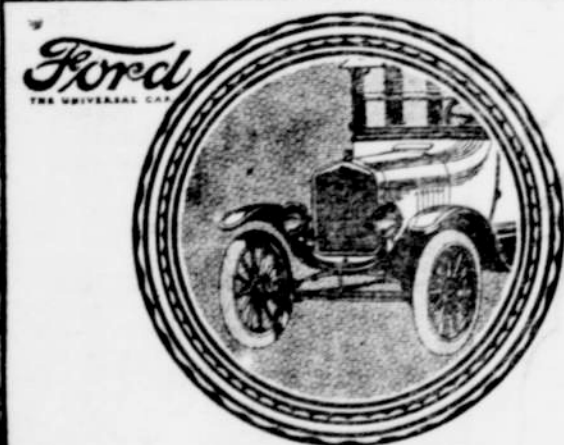
