The promoters of the recall of Governor Pierce have laid down and the ballot will not be burdened with the vote this November. It is said that those who were securing petitions found that there was a great sentiment against the movement, and if it held throughout the state, as it does in Washington county, there are thousands who would have voted to sustain the governor—and this from the ranks of those who did not support him at the general election. The scheme of recall was fathered in obscurity and no one wished to assume the parentage of the child.

CIRCUIT COURT

The case of O. B. Hathaway, plaintiff, versus Geo. Alexander, sheriff, was decided by a jury in favor of the official, this week. The jury—R. Bowlby, A. Knox, Geo. Harms, Clem Shaner, Wm. Matzke, John Milne, H. J. Smith, Jennie L. Gray, A. King, J. C. Bechen, C. J. Herb and Geo. Beal Jr.

Dallas Murray, of Huber, was fined \$50 for assault. Ahern, Nelson and Probst were each fined \$500 and a jail sentence for violation of the liquor law. On payment of \$100 each will stand paroled. Ahern and Nelson were in the smashup near Beaverton, last spring, when a woman was killed, after a party at a resort near Beaverton.

C. Vandomelon paid \$100 on a liquor law charge. To plead Oct. 29—State vs. Robinson, Harry Jehman, M. Heuer, M. G. Jones, Ben Konig, A. Lott, John Erickson. Frank Keibus pleaded guilty and sentence will be imposed later.

Pleaded not guilty—Ralph Simpson; B. Sobowski, F. Stewe, Steve Yorkovich, Robt. Carlson, all liquor charges.

State vs. Geo. Susbauer, plea of not guilty entered. The trial of Minnie Brackbush, charged with violation of the prohibition law, consumed two days in court this week and the jury was sent out to deliberate last night. At press hour they had returned no verdict.

GOLDEN WEDDING

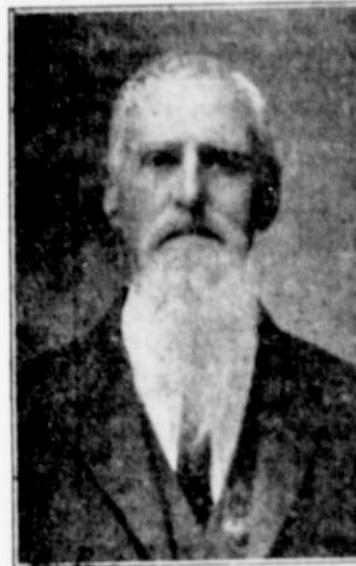

SIDEWALKS ORDERED IN

An ordinance providing for the construction of cement sidewalks on west Main street, bordering property owned by Miss Bertha Tongue and J. F. Heineck, amounting to more than 80 feet, was passed by the city council at the regular meeting Tuesday night. The city attorney was also instructed to draw up an ordinance providing for cement sidewalk construction at Fifth and Oak streets on property owned by W. V. Wiley, a stretch near the grammar school needed for the use of the school children.

The American Legion was granted the use of the auditorium for a dance on Armistice Day, at which time the Washington county celebration will be held here. In support of the Legion the city will pay for the janitor work and lights.

The penalty provided for failure of property owners to pay for street improvements was waived when the Shute Savings Bank took up a block in the Heide addition and paid all costs connected with the taking up of the property by the city. The bank paid all street improvements and the money required by the city to bid the property in.
