MANSFIELD TO SPEAK HERE

Will Offer Solution to the Farm Problem Tuesday

"Farmer's Problems and Their Remedy" will be the subject of George A. Mansfield, candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator, when he speaks at the courthouse next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. Mr. Mansfield was president of the Farm Bureau for four years and is an interesting and forceful speaker.

He will tell of interesting questions affecting the welfare of the American farmer. He contends that Oregon is being bled white by unjust discrimination in finance, transportation, marketing and taxation. He will attempt to offer a solution of these problems.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

(O.A.C. Home Economics Dept.) Baked custards will not curdle if they are put in a pan of water to bake. The water should not be allowed to boil.

In making meringues, use 3 tablespoons of sugar to one egg white. Place in a moderate oven that will take it about 15 minutes to brown and you will have a meringue that will keep its shape.

Soft custards curdle, beat with a duster egg beater till smooth.

Animal crackers dipped in chocolate make a nice surprise for the school lunch box.

Fruit preserves may be made with far less sugar if salt is used. They must be kept a few days before using, so that the salty taste is no longer distinguishable. Allow 1/2 cup of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt to each pound of fruit.

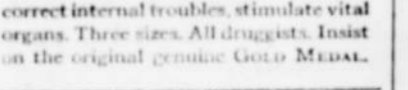

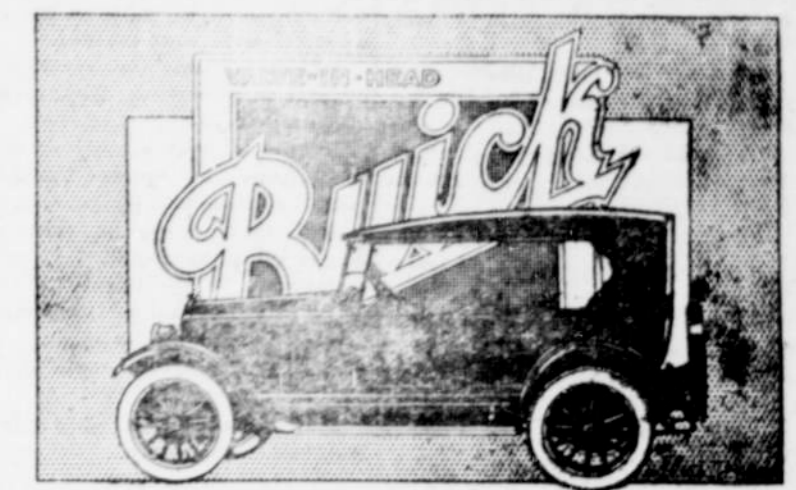
