

CEDAR MILLS FARMER HANGS SELF YESTERDAY

H. M. Basford, Thought Despondent Over Ill Health. Burial Tomorrow

H. M. Basford, a farmer of near Cedar Mills, and who formerly lived near this city, committed suicide yesterday morning by hanging himself with a rope tied to the rafters of his porch. He had been making preparations all morning, according to Wilbur Williams, who went out after the body and was told the circumstances by the housekeeper.

He asked the housekeeper to go with him, and in fear she ran the neighbors for assistance, but when they returned he was dead. Mr. Basford had been in ill health for some time and is believed to have become despondent because of this.

He has been a resident of the county for many years and was well known in Hillsboro.

His sister died in February. He was born in Maine and was more than 30 years of age.

The funeral will be held from the Bell chapel tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Roswurm Ends Life

Walter Roswurm, a prominent Forest Grove resident, shot himself through the head at about midnight last night. Cause for the act is unknown. He was in the real estate business in Forest Grove for a number of years. He is survived by his widow.

Don't fail to keep an eye out for the person who endangers your forests and your lives by doing things which are liable to cause fires. Don't fail to report all such persons to the Forest officers just as you would any criminal. Don't throw inflammable articles from your automobile.
