"The Ten Commandments," Long Record Picture, Starts Sunday at New Venetian

The picture which broke all long run records at road show prices will be the second production to be shown at the new Venetian theatre here Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, according to an announcement of O. Phelps, veteran theatre manager and owner, who is giving Hillsboro its biggest attraction in the new theatre.

Playing in the "two-day" in New York City, "The Ten Commandments" broke the record of 59 weeks which had been held by "The Covered Wagon," remaining at capacity business for 62 consecutive weeks. "The Birth of a Nation" was only able to last 44 weeks on Broadway, while "Way Down East," "The

Four Horsemen," and "The Thief of Bagdad" held up for a lesser period. About five million people have seen this remarkable picture since it was first shown at a two-dollar scale.

In Los Angeles it held up for 31 weeks, Chicago and Philadelphia 20, Boston 14, San Francisco and Cleveland 8; while in Detroit, Washington and Cincinnati it stayed 5 weeks. Sidney, Australia, played host to it for 30 weeks as did Melbourne; while Paris and Auckland, New Zealand, greeted it enthusiastically for 10 weeks. Berlin, as impoverished as it was at the time, played the picture for 4 weeks, with the best seats selling at five dollars each.
