Mrs. J. W. Connell, leader, presented Rev. L. C. Poor, pastor of the Methodist church, who gave an interesting address on "The American Home." "Church, school and home are the three great institutions of life and the greatest of these is the home," said Rev. Poor in the fore part of his address. A vivid mental picture of a home, its location, its architecture, its furnishings and its atmosphere was painted by the speaker. He described how pictures, periodicals and associates can mould a child's life. "There is no influence in a child's life as penetrating, as good, as persuasive as an ideal home with parents there to guide them," said Rev. Poor. The speaker stated that the age of a criminal has decreased ten years. Statistics show that fifty per cent of crimes are committed by men and women under twenty years of age.
